Time is Running Out!

That is one title the science fair group is considering for their science fair project this year. Third graders Arthur, Audrey, and Ms. Yada learned in science that the water clock was known to have existed in Babylon and Egypt around the year 1600 B.C. Some claim that water clocks appeared in China as early as 4000 B.C. A water clock is any timepiece that uses a regulated flow of liquid into or out from a vessel to measure time. Water clocks and sundials are some of the oldest time measuring instruments. In Edgenuity, we learned to make a water clock out of plastic cups. Each week, we are testing different liquids for their viscosities to see how long it takes for liquids to pass from one cup through the other. While third graders' science projects cannot go on to the county level, we can enter our project in a group of three, that will be represented at the virtual District Science Fair in lanuary.



Here is Arthur with his water clock. He and Audrey are doing a great job testing their hypotheses about which liquids will take the slowest to go through the water clock and analyzing the data why some liquids are going slower than others.

It's Never Too Early to Think About College and Career Readiness

At Desert Learning Academy, it is never too early to discuss students' plans for the future. In the past, students have researched different colleges and made posters and banners they shared with other students and staff. This year I would like students to research careers and make a video describing the job, its requirements, education, salary, and other interesting information. Digital Storytelling is a wonderful way for students to write a script, match their images to their audio and edit for presentation. If you are interested in having your child learn these skills, I will be starting digital storytelling classes soon.


Writing Ideas
