For most of you, this will be your first AP class, so here are some quick facts about what these courses are:

- Introductory college level course
- More advanced than honors courses as the reading materials, tests, and writing pieces are considered to be at the college level
- High expectations for students:
 - Self-motivated to learn information
 - Must value not only grades, but also learning, in general

The AP Human Geography test is set for **May 5, 2020**.

What is AP Human Geography?

- Introduction to human geographic concepts
- Geographers study the way patterns and processes shape how people understand, use, and change the Earth's surface. This course will look at **how geography affects humans**.
- Key topics: population issues, culture, political geography, economics, agriculture, and urbanization

Recommended Supplies for this course:

- 1. Composition notebook with 100 pages at minimum (no spirals)
- 2. Sandwich-sized plastic bags
- 3. Highlighter
- 4. 3 ½ x 5 note cards (these will be used all year, so getting 3-4 packs when they are cheaper right before the school year begins could be helpful).

Summer Assignments:

There will be a lot of reading and writing in this course. In order to do well, it is important that you complete the assigned readings and vocabulary outside of class. The following summer assignments will help you become familiar with the course.

There are only two assignments and they are both due on Friday of the second week of class, with points deducted for each week they are late. This is intended to be summer homework, so if it is not completed during the summer, you will be working on it while working on other work for the class. Summer Assignment 1:

Unit 1 vocabulary note cards: You have the entire summer to complete this. If you work on one color at a time, that will make this seem like a lot less work.

Vocabulary note card instructions

- Vocabulary definitions do not need to be in complete sentences. Only write the most important information.
- 2. Turn in vocabulary sets the day they are due.
- 3. Points will be deducted for late cards.
- 4. Cards should be hand-written and easy to read. Cards will be placed in a plastic sandwich bag with your name written on it and turned in.

How to make vocab cards:

Front Side:

- 1. Word
- 2. Unit name (i.e.- nature of geo, political, agriculture)

Back Side:

1. Definition (top)- define using your own words (do not copy directly from text or internet. Not all words will be located in the textbook. If

you need to search for it online, in the search bar type **"AP Human** Geography + the term"

- 2. Example(s) (center)- i.e. an example of an isoline map is a topographic map. If it is a person, you could include one of their accomplishments; if it is a model, you could include a realistic application of the model.
- 3. Picture (bottom)- this can be hand drawn, printed and glued, colored or not. It should fit on the card and represent the topic in some way.

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Summer Assignment 2:

The concept of **diffusion** will repeat itself in many ways throughout the course. For this assignment, choose any topic that you are interested in. It could be food, music style, product, company, clothing, etc. On a blank piece of white paper, create an infographic about the topic and its diffusion process around the world. You may need to look up the term diffusion first to gain a better understanding of what this means. Include information about:

- 1. Where your topic originated or came from
- 2. When it started/began
- 3. How it was diffused
- 4. Type of diffusion and explanation
- 5. Color visuals (printed or drawn) to represent your topic
- 6. A map that visually shows the spread of this topic throughout the world.

Example Topics: football, hip-hop music, fashion or make-up trends, etc.
