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Parent and Family Engagement at PSUSD

Purpose

This Parent and Family Engagement Policy describes the means for carrying out designated Title I, Part A, parent and family engagement requirements pursuant to the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Section 1116.

Palm Springs Unified School District has developed this policy, jointly with parents, that establishes the district's expectations and objectives for meaningful family engagement. This policy outlines PSUSD's commitment to engage families in the education of their children and to build the capacity at its schools to implement family engagement strategies and activities designed to achieve the district and student social and emotional well-being, and academic achievement goals.



Family Engagement District Overview

Palm Springs Unified School District supports successful parent and family engagement and interactions.

- PSUSD has established a Family Engagement Department that includes two district wide family centers.
- PSUSD employs Community Liaisons including; Attendance Community Liaisons, English Learner Community Liaisons, Family Center Community Liaisons, and eight Family and Community Engagement Specialists.
- Events, workshops and trainings are offered by the PSUSD Family Engagement Department including: District wide
 conferences, weekly Family Nights, Technology 101, Internet Safety, Computer Science Nights, ESL courses, parenting
 courses and the 7 Habits of Successful Families Course. These events and workshops are available to be offered at school
 sites.
- PSUSD utilizes focus groups, surveys, and workshops, to evaluate district programs and policies.
- Parent/Family Advisory Committees and Stakeholder groups are welcomed as partners with PSUSD. Advisory groups include the following:

 - District English Learner Advisory Council (DELAC)/ English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC)

 - School Site Councils LCAP Parent Ambassadors: Stakeholders that provide input regarding LCAP goals and budget
 - o Family Engagement District Advisory Council (FEDAC): Reviews District Family Engagement Policy bi-annually
 - Family Engagement Teacher Advisory Council (FETAC): Receives training to support school site family engagement policy and assessment of school site family engagement climate
 - o Coordinated Early Intervention Support (CEIS): Addresses issues of inequity and disproportionate data
 - Desert Hot Springs Alliance: Collaboration between One Future Coachella Valley, PSUSD, city politicians, community businesses and non-profit leaders to address the issue of chronic absenteeism in DHS
 - Superintendent's Parent Advisory: PSUSD Superintendent meets quarterly with parent representatives from each school site to discuss the state of the district, data, LCAP and family engagement
 - PAC President & Superintendent Forum: meeting between PSUSD Superintendent and Parent Advisory Council
 Presidents on a quarterly basis
 - Anti-Racist Coalition: Coalition of parents, PSUSD staff, and students that are working to actively work against racism and build anti-racist systems in our community



Annual LCAP survey data and parent advisory feedback indicate PSUSD parent needs including: bilingual communication at school sites and school district, clarity regarding academic standards addressed and current teaching methods, availability of supplemental support including tutoring and mental health services, opportunities for flexible communication with educators and school staff, access and support with technology and communication platforms.

Data shows some barriers to parent involvement include: high levels of poverty and economic hardship, transportation needs, scheduling conflicts with work, language barriers, and limited understanding of or access to technology and WIFI. PSUSD departments collaborate to ensure full opportunities for participation of all parents and guardians by providing hot spots, technology training and one on one support.

The Family Engagement District Advisory Council (FEDAC) will meet twice a year to conduct, with meaningful involvement of parents, a bi-annual evaluation of the content and effectiveness of this policy on improving academic quality at our school sites. PSUSD will conduct an annual evaluation through a parent survey, the link will be sent out through email and text message. Parents will have the opportunity to send the PSUSD Family Engagement Department valuable feedback regarding the parent and family engagement activities and programs, and the effectiveness of this policy on improving academic quality at our schools through their participation in parent advisory groups.

Reservation of Funds

Section 1116 of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) contains the primary Title I, Part A requirements for schools and school systems to involve parents and family members in their children's education. 1% of the Title I, Part A LEA allocation minus the nonprofit private school equitable services proportional share amount is reserved for parent and family engagement opportunities. Each school's School Site Council aides in the allocation of these funds. PSUSD's FETAC site representatives can advise School Site Council in developing parent and family engagement budgets. The district will provide clear guidance and communication to assist each Title I school in developing an adequate family engagement budget that addresses their needs assessment and parent recommendations. In addition to the 1% Title I Parent and Family Engagement reservation additional Title I funds are allocated. Title I funds are allocated to support the Supplemental Intervention Department in their parent engagement activities. Additional requests for parent engagement funds can be requested and are reviewed for possible additional funding. 90% of the 1% Parent and Family Engagement reservation is distributed to school sites as parent involvement funds. School sites must clearly specify in their School Plans for Student Achievement how the Title Parent Involvement funds will be used in a purposeful way to increase parent engagement.



Building Parent Capacity

PSUSD staff will provide opportunities for parents to be involved in developing their school's improvement plans which include participating in a school site council, parent advisory groups, parent leader groups (PTA/PTG/PTO), attending an LCAP discussion session, attending a district advisory meeting, or by submitting written feedback.

Every PSUSD school site will hold annual Title 1 meetings, have established systems for parent input, meet regularly with parent leader groups including school site council and ELAC, and utilize information gained to develop school improvement plans. At the Title I meetings, parents and families are provided with copies of the school site's written family engagement policy.

Through courses, workshops and events, information and materials are provided to parents that can assist them in helping their children improve with academic achievement. Throughout the year, various parent/guardian meetings are held, in a variety of locations (currently virtually), to inform families about the programs and services available to all PSUSD families. These meetings and workshops are publicized through school sites, through the FEC's outreach and other district outreach. PSUSD's Superintendent, board members, district administrators, program directors, teachers and other personnel participate in these meetings, as appropriate, to explain their roles and how to access all of PSUSD's departments and programs.

PSUSD offers parents/guardians trainings and workshops to help improve student achievement including:

Technology, Distance Learning, Internet Safety, English as a Second Language, and Google Suite. Various parent engagement activities that encourage literacy and technology proficiency are offered by the PSUSD's FEC at several school sites (or under current circumstances, virtually) including: Family Literacy Nights, Family Math Nights, and Family Computer Science Nights.

School sites offer parents materials and resources covering content curriculum that will support extended learning at home. This includes homework guides, suggested learning activities for the family and distance learning supplies.

PSUSD's English Learner Department provides ongoing family meetings, training and tutoring. Students and parents are offered opportunities to continue to learn during school breaks including winter, spring and summer breaks.

PSUSD's Supplemental Services program provides year long tutoring at school sites, family neighborhoods and the school district.

In an effort to assist families in understanding state academic standards and assessments, PSUSD offers the following resources: CAASP information sessions, resources for effective communication during parent/teacher conferences, the LCAP Parent Ambassadors Academy Program, and individual LCAP trainings for every school site council team. PSUSD provides assistance to parents and families to monitor their child's progress by providing ParentVue training and other communication platform tutorials such as Gmail, ClassDojo, Remind101, and Seesaw for Families. School and Family Policies or Compacts are available to provide parents with a resource that helps them understand the assessments and standards as well as how they can support their children in partnership with teachers, their school and PSUSD.

When planning parent and family engagement activities at the school and district level, local, state, and federal programs are considered. Opportunities for PSUSD community programs to collaborate with the school district are made public using a variety of communication tools. PSUSD family engagement activities and services will often be offered in collaboration and coordination with the six school site parent centers, Riverside County Office of Education, OneFuture Coachella Valley, Desert Regional Medical Center, LGBTQ Center, IEHP, Smile Factory, Borrego Community Health Clinic, Desert Hot Springs Community Health and Wellness Center, Cathedral City Library, Desert Hot Springs Resource Center, Martha's Village and Kitchen, Tolerance Education Center, Catholic Charities, National Charity League, Betty Ford Center, SunLine transportation, College of the Desert, Cal State San Bernardino, Safe House of the Desert, Palm Springs Black History Committee, Digicom Foundation, Salvation Army, Blu Foundation, Foundation for PSUSD, The Mexican Consulate, Riverside Behavioral Health Center, Find Food Bank, Jewish Family Services of the Desert, Riverside County Family Resource Centers, Loma Linda Medical University, Coachella Valley Adult Education, Cesar Chavez FIELD Foundation, CTE Academies, Big Brothers Big Sisters, PTA Council and PTA District, HOPE Collaborative, Flying Doctors, El Sol Neighborhood Community Group, Eisenhower Medical Hospital, AL-ANON in the Desert, NAMI Coachella Valley, The Well in the Desert, Rotary International Clubs, local churches, neighboring districts and City Councils to plan and implement effective parent and family involvement activities. PSUSD will coordinate with the Riverside Office of Education and California Department of Education to offer Early Childhood Education classes, ECE programs include Head Start, Early Head Start, and the California State Preschool Program.

PSUSD ensures that other reasonable support to encourage parental involvement in activities is provided when needed to build the capacity of our parents. This includes availability of bilingual staff, child care, rotating of district wide meetings and events to school sites in different cities that are a part of PSUSD, translation services, assistance with service referrals and form completion.

PSUSD and it's school sites will provide translators for parents upon request for parents so they may fully participate in meetings, school events and activities.

Parent input is gathered regularly and from all stakeholders, and is utilized to enhance our parent and family engagement activities and resources.



PSUSD provides the following technical assistance to support parents and families as needed:

- Family Center staff available to answer questions or to direct parents and families to appropriate departments.
- Reasonable expenses associated with parent involvement activities, including transportation and child care costs are paid to enable parents/guardians to participate in school-related meetings and training sessions.
- Make referrals to community agencies and organizations to improve the conditions of parents/guardians and families.
- Provide a master calendar of district activities and district meetings.
- Provide information about opportunities for parent involvement through the district newsletter, web site, phone applications and social media accounts. Engage parent-teacher organizations to actively seek out and involve parents/guardians through regular communication updates and information sessions.
- Provide translation services at school sites and at meetings involving parents/guardians as needed.
- Provide training and information to members of district and school site councils, parent leader groups and advisory committees to help them fulfill their functions.
- Provide a family friendly document and workshop that outlines "Ten Things Every PSUSD Parent Should Know".
- Professional Development for parents is offered 24/7 through an online learning portal called SHAPE. SHAPE allows individuals to complete short, incremental activities that support engagement, growth and learning.





PSUSD will ensure that parents frequently receive information related to school and parent programs, meetings, and other activities and in languages that families can understand. A variety of methods are to be used to share information including hard copy flyers, digital flyers, emails, text messages, phone calls, marquees, local media, and social media. Utilizing the digital communication tool Blackboard, emails, phone messages, and text messages will be sent to parents in their home language. Many of these tools allow for two way communication between families and schools. Attendance, English Learner and Family Center Community liaisons are used for personal communication with families as needed and for strategic outreach to underrepresented families.





Strengthening Our Schools

PSUSD works with school sites including teachers, principals and other school leaders to provide assistance and support with family engagement activities, events, courses, school connected parent groups and policy development. Information regarding best practices for family engagement is provided via the PSUSD Family Center Handbook. The PSUSD Family Engagement Coordinator meets with all principals to review school site family engagement plans and activities. Input and support is provided by the PSUSD Family Engagement Department.

PSUSD with the assistance of its schools and parents, educates its teachers, support personnel, principals, school leaders, and other staff, in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners through various professional development opportunities. The objectives of PSUSD's trainings are to assist with our staff family and community connections, build their capacity to work with diverse families, and encourage the belief that partnering with parents and community is essential. PSUSD is committed to working with parents in training them on the use of all communication tools to foster the ties between parents/families and the school. Expectations are set of teachers and schools to collaborate with parents and families as equal partners.

In addition, the Family Engagement Teacher Advisory
Council (FETAC) which consists of representatives from
every school site. Participating teachers receive training
and work collaboratively around issues of family and
community engagement. FETAC site representatives hold
two school site meetings with the school principal and
parents to solicit feedback on the school improvement plan.
The teacher representatives share responsibility in working
with principals, community members and community
liaisons (where available).



The following expectations support the PSUSD Family Engagement Policy:

- Ensure that teachers provide frequent reports to parents/guardians on their children's progress and hold parent-teacher conferences at least once per year with parents/guardians of elementary school students. Respond to parent concerns and requests promptly on time through applications such as: ClassDojo, Google Classroom, Remind101, Seesaw and ParentVUE.
- Provide information about parent involvement opportunities through the district, school, and/or class newsletters, the district's website, and social media platforms.
- Develop mechanisms to encourage parent/guardian input on district and school issues.
- Strengthen two-way communication with parents, including parents who
 have limited English proficiency by providing communication applications
 training to parents.
- Integrate parent engagement policies into school academic goals and plans.
- Coordinate efforts with PSUSD departments and individuals that can further support parent and family needs including the Special Education
 Department, the Early Childhood Education Department, District Specialists and Teachers on Special Assignment, School Community Liaisons, the Mental Health Department, the English Learner Department, Supplemental Services
 Department, and the PSUSD Family Engagement Department.
- Teachers participating in the Family Engagement Teacher Advisory Council (FETAC) disseminate information gained to their peers including knowledge of the National PTA Standards for Family-School Partnerships, The Family Engagement Framework, and Epstein's 6 Types of Parent Involvement Framework.





The Family Engagement Department staff coordinates and provides ongoing guidance and professional development to school site representatives on effective parent and family engagement activities throughout the school year through the Family Engagement Teacher Advisory Committee. PSUSD collaborates and meets with the Early Learning Consortium, Hope Collaborative, James O. Jessie, Palm Springs Rotary and Riverside County Office of Educations. Meetings are scheduled between PSUSD representatives and local community organizations to create common goals that focus on student needs. Schools, parents and families are provided with opportunities to gain resources, skills, training and consultations from various community agencies that build their capacity and ability to effectively support their child's academic achievement and school performance.

PSUSD coordinates with programs such as the Local Plan for Special Education, Child Care and Development, Preschool/Early Childhood Education, Education for English Learners, Migrant Education Program and Career and Technical Education to provide continuous professional development, stakeholder meetings, services and to address the needs of all student populations and annual updates to district policies.

Policy Assessment and Accessibility

ESSA Section 1116 [a][2][A] / [a][2][F] / [f]

The Family Engagement District Advisory Council (FEDAC), which is composed of parents, teachers and district staff, has the role of creating, assessing and updating this policy. FEDAC's assessment of this policy will be used to design and/or revise strategies to improve the District's Family and Community Engagement Policy and will be incorporated in the school/district wide improvement plan. This document will be reviewed by the Family Engagement District Advisory Council and updated annually to meet the needs of families and schools.

PSUSD will distribute this policy that has been written in a format and language that all parents can understand, in print to all parents and guardians as part of our Annual Notice to parents at the beginning of each new school year. PSUSD will post this policy on the district's website in Spanish and English.

Adoption

This Policy was adopted by the <u>Palm Springs Unified School District</u> on February 23, 2021 and will be in effect for the 2021-2022 school year.

The LEA will distribute this Policy to all parents and families of students participating in the Title I, Part A program on, or before: October 31, 2021.

FAMILY ENGAGEMENT COURSES AND WORKSHOPS

7 HABITS OF SUCCESSFUL FAMILIES

A workshop based on Stephen R. Covey's #1 best sellers The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People® and The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Families®. This engaging family-strengthening program has proven successful with all kinds of families because it uses a self-discovery and adult-learner approach.

7 HABITS OF SUCCESSFUL FAMILIES BOOK CLUB

A book club that focuses on Stephen R. Covey's #1 best sellers The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People® and The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Families®. This book club offers parents the opportunity to connect what they learn on the workshop with their weekly readings and discuss with other parents of PSUSD.

10 THINGS EVERY PARENT SHOULD KNOW

This 30 minute workshop introduces parents with important information about PSUSD. Parents are introduced and presented with phone numbers of the various departments of our district as well as an introduction to the services PSUSD offers.

COFFEE CHATS

An opportunity offered to parents of PSUSD to join and share their opinions and experiences on their current reality. Parents are presented with the opportunity to connect and learn from other parents of the district.

COLLEGE PATHWAYS

Workshops designed for parents to learn about high school requirements and different options after high school, the application process, financial aid and scholarships, and hear from students and parents that already went through the process in order to help guide their students.

CYBERBULLYING

Course designed to introduce internet safety to parents with children attending our school district. Including: Technology Today & Moderation, Cyberbullying, Privacy & Internet Safety, and Digital Identity.

GMAIL TUTORIAL

Parents taking the course will be introduced to basic computer/chromebook navigation. Once parents can navigate their chromebooks, parents will be taught to search the internet and use their gmail account. Parents will also learn how to write an e-mail, read and email and navigate their Google account.

PARENTVUE TUTORIAL

Course designed to introduce parents to the benefits of having a ParentVUE account. Parents will sign up and learn how to utilize ParentVue to view their child's attendance, grades and communicate with their child's teachers.





FAMILY ENGAGEMENT COURSES AND WORKSHOPS

COURAGE TO SPEAK

A multi-session substance abuse education and preventing program providing parents with the knowledge of how to keep children safe. This Program Covers: Teaching Drug Refusal Skills, Understanding Emotional Pain and Teaching Children, How to Cope, Knowing the Signs of Drug Use, Effective Communication and Listening Strategies with Children Around Drugs, Protective Psychological and Developmental Factors, Helping Your Child Handle Stress, Practical Steps to Take if Use is Suspected, Parent Resources on Where to Find Help And More.

ENGLISH CLASSES

The goal of an ESL program is to improve the students' level of English. Our ESL classes teach different language skills, depending on students' English abilities, interests, and needs. All programs teach the following: conversational English, grammar, reading, listening comprehension, writing, and vocabulary.

NURTURING PARENTING

Nurturing Parenting is an interactive 10-week course that will help you better understand your role as a parent. It helps strengthen your relationship and bond with your child. Learn new strategies and skills to improve your child's behavior. Learn how to take care of yourself as a parent. The lessons include: The philosophy and practices of Foster with Affection, ages and stages of the development of children from birth to three years of age, how to promote positive brain development in children and adolescents, how to communicate with respect, how to strengthen our feelings of worth, how to understand feelings, how to develop the moral, values and rules of the family, how to praise children and their good behavior, discipline without hitting.

POSITIVE ACTION PARENTING


This course teaches parenting through a positive action philosophy, covering the physical, intellectual, and socialemotional areas of the whole self. You will learn how to foster your own positive thoughts, actions, and feelings, which help create a more positive family life for yourself and your children.

POSITIVE INFLUENCES AND CHOICES

This four session class focuses on Coping with Stress, Parent & Child Relationships, Life Improvement & Connections and Safety. This course is offered by the John F. Kennedy Memorial Foundation.

STRENGHTENING FAMILIES PROGRAM

Strengthening Families is a research-informed approach to increase family strengths, enhance child development, and reduce the likelihood of child abuse and neglect. It is based on engaging families, programs, and communities in building five key Protective Factors. It is a program for parents and children ages 3-5, 6-11 and 12-16 in higher risk families. SFP consists of parenting skills, children's life skills, and family skills training courses.





FAMILY ENGAGEMENT EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

EQUITY COMMUNITY CONFERENCE

The Equity Community Conference is brought to PSUSD to improve equitable, sustainable experiences and outcomes for historically underrepresented students. Conference speakers will include school, district and community leaders. The conference is geared toward PSUSD administrators, educators, families, students and the community.

EXCELLENCE AWARDS CEREMONY

The Family Center for PSUSD holds this ceremony to honor students, teachers, parents and community members' accomplishments and contributions during the school year. The following categories are recognized during this ceremony: PSUSD Teachers of the Year, Top Ten Seniors of each High School, Community Partners, and Parent Volunteers of the Year. We believe that all of these people make our schools great and are essential for the success of our students.

COMMUNITY GIVING DAY

PSUSD's Family Center partners with the community and school sites to gather donations including food, toys, and clothing to help PSUSD families that are in need during the holidays.

AFTER SCHOOL FAMILY FUN


HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH EVENT

Know about opportunities to provide input at school site council meetings, ELAC meetings and PTG/PTA/PTO meetings.

What will LCAP Parent Ambassadors do?

LCAP Parent Ambassadors participate in a year long academy that includes LCAP discussions with the Director of Federal and State Funding, presentations from PSUSD department leaders, and leadership development activities.

TIPS FOR TEACHERS



TIPS FOR TEACHERS ON FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Welcome every student's family as your education partner.

Assume every family wants the best for their children. Parents look to you as the expert. Guide them on what you think they need to do to help their student achieve success.

Communicate frequently and in the way that works best for each family.

Whether via phone, email, text message or handwritten notes, communicate with each family in a way that not only reaches them—but also generates a response. Include positive feedback to build trust and respect. Seek translation support from your school if there is a language difference.

Teach families how to support student success.

Like students, families don't know the education terminology you do. Describe what you need families to do at home in simple and specific terms. Use examples whenever possible. The more you share, the more families will understand their role as your education partner.

Encourage families to *speak up* for the needs of their student.

Let families know that they are your education partner. Explain that you need them to share the other factors that may affect their student's performance so that you can help navigate challenges or offer more support.

Share power with families and students when working to improve the school.

Empower families and students to contribute their voices, time and energy to making your school a better place to learn—and to work.

Collaborate with community partners that can support families.

Learning happens in the classroom, in the home and in the community.

Connect families to the resources available to enrich the educational experience.

PARENT-TEACHER CONFERENCES

Parent-teacher conferences are an important component of ongoing home- school communication and family involvement in your classroom. This tip sheet is designed to buil on your own experiences and provide you with additional information to help make your parent-teacher conferences productive and effective.





- **Send invitations** include information about the time and goals of the conference, as well as alternative scheduling options using Zoom or Google Meet.
- **Review Student Work** Be prepared to go over student data, assignments, and assessments during the conferences. Have a student portfolio ready to review with guardians.
- **Prepare thoughts and materials-** Create an agenda or list of key issues you want to discuss about each student's progress and growth.
- **Send reminders-** Prior to conference, send home a letter, or a digital reminder for when and where the conference will be held.
- Create a welcoming environment- Greet parents and create a welcoming environment for them just as you do for your students!



- Discuss progress and growth- Starting with the positive, let families know about their child's abilities.
- Use examples- Walk parents through the assignment that demonstrate student's progress and abilities.
- Ask questions and listen actively- Solicit family input into student strengths, needs and learning styles.
- **Seek solutions collaboratively-** Avoid judgements about what "they" should do and instead emphasize how "we" can work together to resolve any problems.
- Make an action plan- Spend the last few minutes discussing how you and the family will support the student.
- Establish lines of communication- Describe how you will communicate with families and they can contact you.

After

- Follow up with families- Contact parents who attended the conference and thank them.
- Communicate regularly- Communicate on an ongoing basis with families, with positive news as well as updates on student progress and challenges. Let families know about other opportunities for them to be involved.
- **Connect in- class activities-** Create responsive instructional practices based on what you learned about family cultures, home learning environments, and student strengths and needs.

BUILD CAPACITY & CREATE CONNECTIONS

Action

Principal or Family Engagement Designee encourages and recruits parents to be engaged in school activities and participate as members of PTA, ELAC, School Site Council and LCAP Parent Ambassadors

Examples

- Encourage active involvement of all parents in school leadership programs, ensuring that meetings are held with translation
- Start a PTA/PTG, and attend meetings
- Offer parent courses and workshops based on parent needs/requests
- Include parents in planning of school events and programs
- Share data and information with parents including ways to support student success such as testing expectations

COMMUNICATION TOOLS



Communication is the foundation for establishing positive relationships with families that support students' learning. Communication with families may take the following forms: in-person interactions, phone calls, emails, text messages etc. It's important for educators to establish a consistent system of communication with families.



Parents have the ability to monitor student's progress throughout the school year as teacher submit information.



Send messages to individuals or groups without publicising anyone's personal contact information. The app also allows you to translate your messages to more than 70 languages.



Teachers can record and track behavior, create student portfolios, facilitate classroom activities and communicate with parents.



Seesaw allows parents to view students work. This is an opportunity for parents to see what their kids have learned and what they have achieved. Parents are allowed to comment and chat with the teacher.



Log in and start talking to each other. A great alternative to in person meetings with parents and students.

Key Points:

- Authentic Communication- Communication conveys interest in students and their families, welcome them into the learning community!
- Building Trust and Respect- Communication helps build trust and respect to sustain a positive and meaningful learning environment.
- Reciprocal Relationships-Communication affirms that the relationship is reciprocal and lends itself to collaboration that benefits all.
- **Understanding Each Family** Communication allows you to see and understand each family as unique. Learn and celebrate the diverse cultural values from which your students and families come.
- Partnership Orientation- Communication enables you to alleviate parental concerns.
- Focus on Listening- Communication affords you the opportunity to practice a relational approach in which listening is a toll used to understand.
- **Strengths Based Perspective-** Language shapes whether and how information is received. Language that is strengths- based conveys the understanding that students' learning is dynamic.
- Putting People First- Language that recognizes people fist is respectful and reinforces the notion that a single descriptor does not define a person or family.
- Adopting An Inquiry Stance- Language that is respectful supports a partnership approach. Incorporating an inquiry stance helps validate information and experience that families bring to the conversation.
- Accessible Language- Avoid using jargon and acronyms to ensure full understanding.
- Being descriptive- Address problems and concerns as they come up by using specific descriptors and avoiding judgement.
