2021-22 School Year Begins August 4

Following a year and a half of mostly distance learning, Palm Springs Unified School District opens the 2021-22 school year on Wednesday, Aug. 4 with full in-person instruction and traditional schedules. All students are expected to report to classes on that day.

As the region, state and nation are continuing to navigate through the remnants of the COVID-19 pandemic and since vaccinations are not yet available for children under the age of 12, the District will continue to adhere to public health guidelines to ensure staff and student safety including the requirement for wearing face coverings while indoors on any school site. In addition, classroom set-ups will be modified in order to maintain three feet of distance between students wherever possible.

During the school shutdown and continuing over the summer, PSUSD's Nutrition Services Department has been providing curbside meal service in addition to grab and go meals for students enrolled in summer programs. The curbside program concludes on July 30, and regular meal service begins on Wednesday with some modifications in adherence with safety protocols including increased cleaning between meal periods and student hand washing before and after meal service. Breakfast will be served in school multi-purpose rooms, classrooms or "Grab and Go" as students enter campuses, and pre-plated or "Grab and Go" supper will be offered at most schools during after-school programs. Parents should check with individual school sites for specific meal service options.

While PSUSD serves all meals to students at no cost, and families are not required to complete meal applications in order to receive free meals, families who do not receive state benefits will be asked to complete the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) Alternate Income Form, which will be sent to households in September.

"This form helps the District receive the maximum amount of funding for your students' classrooms," said Director of Nutrition Services Stephanie Bruce. "This form is simple to complete and only requires general information including parent name and signature, enrolled student name and student ID/birthdate, number of people in the household and range of income. Thie form is electronic and takes less than a minute to complete."

Parents of students who are eligible for bus transportation will be receiving a letter with assigned bus stops this week. If you believe that your child is eligible for transportation and do not receive a letter by Aug. 2, call (760) 325-8774.

All Palm Springs Unified School District students entering the 7th grade this school year, and all new PSUSD students entering 7th through 12th grade, must show proof of an adolescent whooping cough booster (called "Tdap") to attend school. District officials are asking that students be immunized as soon as possible and present proof of immunization at their school site immediately.

The state Legislature passed a law that went into effect on Jan. 1, 2016, that all students, other than those with a medical waiver signed by a physician, are required to be fully immunized in order to attend school. Students who are not in compliance are required to enroll in an independent study or home-schooling program in order to receive a public-school education.

Borrego Health will provide free Tdap shots will be available by appointment on Wednesday, July 28 from 7:30 to 11 a.m. at North Gate Community Church on Date Palm Drive in Cathedral City and Friday, July 30 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Desert Springs Middle School in Desert Hot Springs. School enrollment and sports physicals will also be offered at this time.

As the Palm Springs Unified School District prepares to commence the 2021-22 school year with full in-person instruction and traditional schedules following a year and a half of distance learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic, many new certificated administrators have joined the District family while others have changed positions during this time.

The District's new Superintendent of Schools **Dr. Mike Swize** officially began his new post on July 1 following the retirement of Dr. Sandra Lyon. Swize began his career in education in PSUSD 31 years ago and has served as a teacher, director, assistant principal, principal and most recently the Assistant Supt. of Educational Services for the past 11 years.

PSUSD Foundation Focus on Mental Health, Instruments, STEM for 2021-22

The Foundation for the Palm Springs Unified School District raises funds for a range of PSUSD programs and projects not covered in school or District budgets. Led by Director Ellen Goodman with the support and guidance of a volunteer Board of Directors, the 501(c)3 Foundation will be focusing efforts on raising funds in the areas of mental health, musical instruments and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) during the 2021-22 school year along with its other annual initiatives.

The Foundation is actively raising funds for the establishment of On-Campus Wellness Centers aimed at providing safe-space retreats and private spaces for counseling students through emotional or mental health challenges during

the school day. The need is heightened at this time since many students are combatting COVID-19 aftermath struggles. According to the "Children's

Report," young people with access to mental health treatment and services in school are 10 times more likely to seek help for mental health and substance abuse concerns than those who do not have such programs available.

Musical Instruments fundraising will focus on the goal of providing recorders, ukuleles, and keyboards for each 3rd, 4th, and 5th grader in the District in recognition of the important skill-building in all areas, including mathematics, that individual musical instruction provides. Post-COVID, it is important that students not share equipment, but have their own dedicated instruments.

STEM labs and "makerspaces" in our district's schools provide hands-on experiences in new and emerging digital technologies – including work with robotics, drones, 3-D printers, e-Sports, and cyber security activities. With this kind of learning so important in the future work force, the Foundation will be raising funds to establish STEM labs at District schools.

The Foundation will also continue its cornerstone Classroom Grants program, which provides funding directly to teachers for projects that they originate and execute. The SMART (Student Mentoring and Resource Training) initiatives matches community volunteers targeted students to counsel them through the college-application and financial-aid application process. The Foundation-established JASI (Jerry Argovitz Sports Institute) program helps student athletes navigate many of the hurdles they encounter. The Foundation also oversees distribution of significant

scholarship monies each year to those students going on to higher education.
