Held in a virtual platform, the event will offer participants the opportunity to discuss the experiences of historically underrepresented students and ways all can work toward more equitable outcomes. Presenters will include PSUSD staff and community partners along with contributions from parents and students. Superintendent of Schools Dr. Mike Swize will welcome attendees at 9 a.m. prior to the presentation by Conference keynote speaker Dr. Abdul-Malik Muhammad.

Muhammad, who has over 25 years serving both youth and adults as an educator, entrepreneur and author working with the underserved in urban and rural areas, has focused on the development of boys to men. He is the founder and CEO of Transforming Lives Inc. and author of the 2019 book The Restorative Journey - Book One: The Theory and Application of Restorative Practices, aimed at

providing inspiration to think and act differently in leadership, relationships, and service to others.


- Rancho Mirage High Assistant Principal Chris Calderwood has been selected as PSUSD's Certificated Administrator of the Year.



EV Chargers at CCHS: Cathedral City High School is the first school to benefit from a state-approved \$10 million Southern California Edison pilot to provide electric vehicle charging stations, including all necessary electrical infrastructure, to K-12 schools within the utility's service area. Construction began recently to install 12 chargers at the school. The recent installation is the first step in PSUSD's plan to lower carbon emission and transition to zero-emission new fleet goals set by the state by 2035. The charging stations, expected to be completed soon, will be available to staff, students and visitors to the campus. EV chargers are planned in the future for additional schools and at the district offices.

Teacher Recruitment Fair Slated for Feb. 26

Palm Springs Unified will host a Teacher Recruitment Fair on Feb. 26 from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the District Service Center in Palm Springs. The district is seeking applicants in all subject areas who hold a valid appropriate teaching credential or will be eligible for a credential for the 2022-23 school year. On-site interviews will be conducted

A \$10,000 incentive will be given to any fully credentialed teacher hired into a position requiring a mild to moderate special education, moderate to several special education, and speech language pathology. A \$7,000 incentive will be given to any fully credentialed teacher hired into a teaching position in the areas of Science or Mathematics.

Interested applicants should submit a job application online at psusd.us/jobs and register for the fair https://docs.google.com/forms/d/e/1FAlpQLSfg7DnjkogxpwslrxlwWAQOaZwrZkd5jwqgAKBH4iZyN_DDkQ/closedform.

Registrants will receive an email prior to the event with a designated arrival time. Fair participants should bring their resume, letter of introduction and three letters of recommendation. Masks will be required.

MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Board Will Vote on Redistricting Boundaries



As we kick off 2022 and the second semester for our students and staff, I hope our community members are navigating through this most recent surge in COVID-19 cases without as many challenges as there were when the pandemic began almost two years ago. For us in the Palm Springs Unified School District, our most recent challenges have been around lower attendance both among students and staff due to the increase in the numbers of cases and exposures. While the first few weeks back from winter break were especially challenging, we are already beginning to see the number of cases and positivity rates decrease. This in combination with the new guidelines from the state

and county which allow for students and staff who are exposed but not having any symptoms to not be required to quarantine, and the quarantine period for those who have tested positive has also been reduced to five days if symptoms are no longer present. We are hopeful that things will continue to improve and that we will be able to resume some traditional activities as we get closer to spring.

I also wanted to share with everyone that our Board of Education will take action at a February board meeting on proposed changes to trustee area boundaries. Due to changes in population and demographics between the 2010 and 2020 census, the district must approve adjustments to trustee area boundaries to bring them within the maximum population variance of 10 percent of less. Following the release of the 2020 census data in September and subsequent presentation of four proposed scenarios that comply with requirements for valid trustee areas, the Board

of Education will take action on new trustee areas next month.

All district trustee areas must contain a nearly equal number of residents, comply with the regulations of the Federal Voting Rights Act (VRA), be as compact and contiguous as possible, respect communities of interest as much as possible follow geographic features as much as possible, and respect incumbency of current board members if possible. The proposed scenarios and information about them can be found in English and Spanish.

Earlier this month, I provided an overview about the redistricting along with the scenarios during a series of live webinars. A webinar recording is available on the district's YouTube Channel. You are invited and welcomed to provide written input on the district's website https://www.psusd.us/domain/5431. We have been receiving some great input on the website, and I encourage all who are interested in this topic or have any suggestions on the proposed scenarios to fill out the input form.

Thank you so much for your continued partnership and support. Having a community that cares as much as ours does makes all the difference in the world to our students, staff, and Board of Education. We are extremely grateful. I wish you all a happy, healthy, and safe 2022.
