The Early Literacy program will focus on building literacy skills in order to earn an elementary school certificate in preparation for the Plazas Secondary Certificate. The primary and secondary instructional program will focus on assisting families in earning their secondary school certificate from the Mexican Consulate in preparation for a California High School Diploma pathway.

The program also provides personal and professional growth opportunities, access to digital media, online courses and networking opportunities with other institutions of higher learning. The Consulate is currently training Parent Coordinator Dr. Ingrid Lin and parent volunteers to administer the program.

The purpose of "Community Plaza" is to encourage, promote and operate educational services for Mexican/Latino Americans, aged 15 and older, who live in Riverside County. Monitored by Lin, the program will be held at the Parent Center labs in Palm Springs and Desert Hot Springs with facilities and technology provided by PSUSD. Primary/secondary courses will be offered on Mondays and Wednesdays from 9 to 11 a.m. and Early Literacy on Tuesdays from 9 to 10:30 a.m. For more information, call (760) 416-1374.

Students Learning Wonders of Desert Through ASES Program

Jason Bruecks' family moved to the Coachella Valley 40 years ago when he was just seven years old. Seeing the fascination he had with his surroundings, his mom enrolled him in a desert nature class at the then Palm Springs Desert Museum, and he was hooked. Today, Bruecks is sharing his desert knowledge and passion with PSUSD elementary and middle school students through his 7-week "Our Desert" afterschool course.

At 18 years old, Bruecks started taking people on desert hikes. Three years ago, he started his business "Distance to Be Traveled Hiking and Outdoor Adventures."

"I took a passion in my life and turned that passion into a business," he said. "Every new day is a chance to share with someone the history, flora and fauna and amazing hiking areas in our desert. Now that's a cool way to live one's life."

Part of the Family YMCA's ASES program, Bruecks' "Our Desert" course introduces students to "their" desert through topics such: desert animals, how and when our desert became a desert, desert birds and bird sounds, rattlesnakes, how desert animals survive, and hiking safety. Each program has video and audio and classroom participation. As an example, students are assigned a place within a visual timeline that includes an ancient ocean, the San Andreas Fault, mountains, rising, Lake Cahuilla, the Salton Sea formation and our present-day desert.

"The youths' participation helps to create a visual and verbal discussion that defines our history," said Bruecks, who became a docent for three years at the age of 8 at Cabot's Museum in Desert Hot Springs. "Sharing these desert topics has allowed me to go full circle in my life. The 7-year-old boy that I was in 1977 had an opportunity to learn about the desert, and now today's youth in PSUSD through Family YMCA in the ASES program have an opportunity to learn about their desert. That is awesome!"
