Family Engagement Conference Set for March 18 at DHSHS

Palm Springs Unified School District's next Family Engagement Conference on March 18 from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Desert Hot Springs High School will feature Parent and Youth Advocate Dr. Lamarr D. Shields, who will give the keynote address.

The goals of the conference are to: increase family and community partnerships, develop a positive working relationship between home and school, promote parents in developing skills that assist their children's education, build relationships and provide resources to meet the needs of parents and create relationships that will reach and assist parents who have language barriers.

Shields, who has appeared on CNN, FOX, ABC, NBC and BET, is a bilingual activist, author, thought leader and Ubuntu teacher who has dedicated his life to inspiring others to pursue a higher, more meaningful purpose. Currently, he is the Senior Director of Education and Innovation at the Cambio Group, an organization focused on cultivating, customizing and advancing the mission and goals for schools, non-profits and other government and non-government agencies through education, arts and advocacy.

Shields uses real life stories that teach and entertain, current research that motivates and practical solutions that empower families and communities to take immediate action towards change.

Following the keynote presentation, Shields will lead a follow-up workshop aimed at empowering parents to become more active partners in their children's educations. The event will also include poetry recitations by PSUSD students and continental breakfast. The event is free, and pre-registration is not required. Free transportation from Cathedral City and Palm Springs and free childcare are also available.

The California League of Schools (CLS), State Superintendent of Public Instruction and the California Middle Grades Alliance recently announced that Desert Springs Middle School in Desert Hot Springs is one of the 11 high-performing California middle schools newly designated as a model middle grades school in the 2016–17 Schools to Watch[™]—Taking Center Stage (STW[™]—TCS) program.

The 11 schools, along with the 19 schools redesignated this year as Schools to Watch, are recognized for "exceeding challenging goals, narrowing the achievement gap and setting students on a solid path toward high school and future successes." Desert Springs was the only Riverside County school named this year and joins John Glenn Middle School in La Quinta as the only Coachella Valley schools recognized in the programs.

"These are 30 fantastic schools that do such a terrific job of helping students succeed with academics and succeed as they face all the other unique challenges of being in middle school," said State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson. "It's a significant time in a student's life, and they need special teachers, staff, and administration to help them prepare for success in 21st century careers and college. These schools do all of that and more. These outstanding schools serve as role models for middle schools up and down the great state of California."

Message from the Superintendent **PSUSD Seeking Community Input for New LCAP**



I hope the start of 2017 has been healthy and happy for all of you. We are currently working on the fourth year of our Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) and, once

again, are seeking input from staff, students, parents and community members on changes, additions or deletions to our current plan.

As part of the state's Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), all districts in California are required to prepare a LCAP, which describes how we intend to meet annual goals for pupils, with specific activities to address state and local priorities identified. This past year, we have been able to provide many additional support programs and services for our students, because we have more local control of our funding. A list of these programs and services can be found within this year's LCAP posted on our website.

We are proud of our efforts, but we know that there is more we can do. As we prepare our 2017-18 plan, we are asking that as many of our stakeholders as possible weigh in with their feedback and suggestions. Earlier this month, we held two community meetings seeking input. If you were not able to attend one of these meetings, you can still provide your feedback and suggestions by responding to our online survey. The deadline for survey response and input is March 03, 2017. The Board of Education will discuss initial actions and outcomes at their Feb. 28 meeting prior to the actual writing of the plan. A Board study session will be held to discuss the proposed 2017-18 plan in April prior to a Board vote in June.
