DHS Teacher Named State Designee for National Teacher of Year



For the first time in Palm Springs Unified School District history, a District teacher has been named the state nominee for National Teacher of the Year honors.

Dr. Brian McDaniel, director of music at Painted Hills Middle School, was named one of five California Teachers of the Year by State

Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson in October and moves forward as California's state nominee for National Teacher of the Year. This is the first time a Riverside County Teacher of the Year has been chosen to represent California in the National Teacher of the Year since 2003 when Coachella Valley Unified's Chauncey Veatch went on to be selected as National Teacher of the Year. James Workman Middle School Teacher Jessica Pack was named a state Teacher of the Year in 2013.

"We are so proud of Dr. McDaniel and the outstanding work he has done with our students, first at Desert Hot Springs High School and now at Painted Hills Middle School and Bella Vista Elementary Schools," said PSUSD Superintendent of Schools Dr. Sandra Lyon. "Dr. McDaniel is a stellar example of our cadre of dedicated professionals who work tirelessly each and every day to do what's best for our students. We are so excited that his talents and perseverance are being recognized in our County and State, and we know he will make our entire state very proud as our representative for National Teacher of the Year."

Both McDaniel and Desert Hot Springs High math teacher Michelle

Beyronneau last May were named two of the four Riverside County Teachers of the Year in May, the first time that PSUSD has had two District winners in the same year. Beyronneau was selected as one of the state's semi-finalists in this year's competition.

"On behalf of the Board of Education, I want to express our extreme pride and excitement over this wonderful announcement," said PSUSD Board of Education President John Gerardi. "We congratulate Dr. McDaniel on his outstanding accomplishment and honor. There is no doubt Dr. McDaniel will represent our District, the city of Desert Hot Springs, Riverside County and the state of California the way he serves his students, with humility, dignity and professionalism. We also want to congratulate Mrs. Beyronneau on being named a semi-finalist for the state. She is another example of the phenomenal educators we have in Palm Springs Unified. We sincerely thank and salute both Dr. McDaniel and Mrs. Beyronneau for their dedication and commitment to their students and the teaching profession."

"To have two of the four Riverside County Teachers of the Year in our District is an amazing honor," said Lyon. "And to have both of our candidates be recognized at the state level – among nearly 300,000 teachers across California, is just incredible. What an honor for our District, the city of Desert Hot Springs and Riverside County!"

McDaniel and Beyronneau will be recognized at the state level at a Sacramento banquet on February 12, where McDaniel's Painted Hills Middle School Choir and Jazz Band has been invited to perform. The National Teacher of the Year will be announced in April, 2018.

PSUSD Seeking Community Input for New LCAP

Palm Springs Unified Schools District is currently working on the fifth year of its Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) and, once again, are seeking input from staff, students, parents and community members on changes, additions or deletions to our current plan.

As part of the state's Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), all districts in California are required to prepare a LCAP, which describes how PSUSD intends to meet annual goals for pupils, with specific activities to address state and local priorities identified. This past year, PSUSD has been able to provide many additional support programs and services for students, due to more local control of funding. As a result of the input received from stakeholders, additions funded during the past year through LCAP include: •Elementary, Secondary Literacy Coaches, •Additional Staff Development, •Career and Technical Education, •Additional Technology Staff and Support, •Class Size Reduction, •District-wide Full Day Kindergarten, •Counseling Support at Elementary and Middle Schools, •Increased arts opportunities

As the District prepares for its 2018-19 plan, stakeholders are being asked to provide feedback and suggestions. Two community forums are scheduled for Jan. 25, 2018 from 5:30 to 7 p.m. at the Edward Wenzlaff Education Center 11625 West Street, Desert Hot Springs; and Jan. 30, 2018 from 6 to 7:30 p.m. at the Palm Springs Unified District Service Center at 150 District Center Way, Palm Springs. Each school site is also hosting a forum. The dates for those forums, along with an input survey (in English and Spanish) for all interested community members to provide suggestions for the 2018-19 LCAP plan, can be found on the home page of the PSUSD website at www.psusd.us.

The deadline for survey response and input is Feb. 15, 2018. The Board of Education will discuss initial actions and outcomes at their Feb. 27 meeting at 6 p.m. prior to the actual writing of the plan. A public hearing on the plan will be held on June 12, 2018, at 6 p.m. prior to the Board vote later that evening.

District Launches New Mobile App

Users can choose which school sites they would like to receive notifications from when new information is posted, and the language for the entire app can be changed to Spanish or a wide array of other languages by simply making the request under "Settings."



Message from the Superintendent 'See Something, Say Something' More Important Than Ever



In the current world of texting and social media, fewer and fewer people - especially our teenagers--are sharing their thoughts and experiences verbally. While there are certainly pluses to our students being able to express themselves via texts and social media without

having to leave their comfort zones, communicating in this fashion also creates added challenges and disadvantages particularly for those of us who are focused on school safety. While, students may be more willing to communicate concerns on one level, on another, they may feel they are protected in anonymity, which creates its own set of issues. They may also assume that because they have read something online or on a social media platform, that others, including the adults around them must know what is going on as well. When it comes to safety, these online communications pose new and serious obstacles for school administrators as they try to ensure that our students are safe and protected from potential dangers.

You may have heard the expression "See something, say something," and these words have never been more crucial than they are today. We do everything we can to teach our students from a young age that if they see or experience something that feels threatening or uncomfortable, they need to share that information with a trusted adult on their school campus as soon as possible in order to protect themselves and their peers from a potentially unsafe situation. The problem today is that when students see something, rather than say something, they post or text. Rather than students seeking out a trusted adult - a teacher, administrator, counselor, security officer or school resource officer - they might instead post something on social media or text their mom or dad. In years prior, if a student wanted to call a parent, he/she had to ask an adult on campus to use a phone. If the student appeared upset, the adult staff member could try and find out if something was wrong and would often discover something that had happened or was going to happen on campus. Now that students can call or text parents and friends without speaking to an adult on campus, students may feel they have connected with someone and the situation is taken care of, when, in fact, the person who has been notified is hours away. Precious time is wasted handling an anxious situation in this manner, not to mention the rumor mill that spreads from posts or texts that may be taken out of context and don't convey the appropriate emotions or urgency that goes along with a verbal report.

Whether it is experiencing or witnessing bullying, being approached by a stranger, an issue or conflict with a teacher, a friend or peer who seems to be struggling emotionally or exhibiting abnormal behavior or anything else that just doesn't feel quite right, we ask our students to share the information with an adult staff member on their campus as soon as they become aware of the incident or behavior. If a student doesn't feel comfortable sharing the information verbally, we do have a mechanism in place where they can make an anonymous report that alerts our administrators as soon as reports are made. The system is called Sprigeo and here is a direct link: https://app.sprigeo.com/. This link can be found on the homepage of our website at psusd.us under the "Parent" drop down.

Texting parents or other students or posting on social media is not the best way to handle a worrisome or threatening situation. In the interest of safety for all, it is of the utmost importance that we encourage our students to share their concerns promptly with an adult on campus or report on sprigeo.com. Our top priority is always the safety of our students and staff, and if we work together with our students, staff and community members we can be as responsive as possible to ensure the maintenance of the safety and welfare of our students.
