All PSUSD Students to Receive Free Meals for 2018-19 School Year

All Palm Springs Unified School District students will be offered breakfast and lunch at no charge at all District school sites for at least the next four years beginning with the first day of school on Aug. 8. The District has amended its policy for serving meals to students under the National School Lunch/School Breakfast program.

The Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) -- through the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) -- provides a non-pricing meal option for school districts in low-income areas -- those with a minimum-identified student percentage of more than 40 percent low-income in the prior school year. The provision allows the District to serve breakfast and lunch at no cost to all enrolled students without collecting household applications. Districts that adopt CEP are reimbursed for the meals using a formula based on the percentage of students categorically eligible for free meals.

Though applications for free or reduced lunch are no longer necessary, the District still requires that parents complete an annual "education benefit form." This year's forms will be mailed home to parents within the next few weeks and is also available and can be completed online at <https://benefitform.psusd.us/>.

"The Board of Education is excited about expanding the school nutrition program to include ALL of our students," said President James Williamson. "A child who is hungry cannot learn. The District is committed to doing anything we can to ensure a supportive learning environment."

Since CEP became available nationwide in 2014, the program has expanded each year and served nearly 9.7 million children in 2016-17. Since CEP operates on a four-year cycle, PSUSD will be providing free lunches for at least the next four years. The District has offered Universal Free Breakfast for the past 10 years.

"We have been working diligently for the past five years to qualify for CEP," said Director of Nutritional Services Stephanie Bruce. "The 2018-19 school year will be the first year we are able to provide this important and needed program to our students. Hungry children can't learn -- that's a fact -- and we in Nutrition Services are so pleased to be able to provide a healthy and nutritious meal to every student who would like one."

PSUSD's 2018-19 School Year Begins August 8

Palm Springs Unified School District opens the 2018-19 school year on Wednesday, Aug. 8. All students are expected to report to classes on that day.

Parents of students who are eligible for bus transportation will be receiving a letter with assigned bus stops this week. If you believe that your child is eligible for transportation and do not receive a letter by Aug. 6, please call your child's school site for a bus assignment.

While applications for free or reduced lunch are no longer required since all District students will receive free meals, parents are required to complete an "education benefit form" for the District. Just one form is required per household. The form is available online at <https://benefitform.psusd.us/>. Paper forms are also available at each school site.

All Palm Springs Unified School District students

entering the 7th grade this school year, and all new PSUSD students entering 7th through 12th grade, must show proof of an adolescent whooping cough booster (called "Tdap") to attend school. District officials are asking that students be immunized as soon as possible and present proof of immunization at their school site immediately.

The state Legislature passed a law that went into effect on Jan. 1, 2016, that all students, other than those with a medical waiver signed by a physician, are required to be fully immunized in order to attend school. Students who are not in compliance are required to enroll in an independent study or home schooling program in order to receive a public school education.

No Unauthorized Access of Any School Campuses to Ensure Student Safety

The Palm Springs Unified School District is implementing a closed campus policy across the District beginning with the start of the 2018-19 school year on Aug. 8. Previously, campus front gates were open before the start of the school day, allowing parents to escort younger children to their classrooms. Now only students will be allowed on campus in an effort to maximize student safety, the gates will not be opened to non-students.

"As most of us are aware, the climate has changed, and now we must consider the possibility that someone could come on a school campus and potentially jeopardize the safety of our students and staff," said Superintendent of Schools Dr. Sandra Lyon. "While we know statistically that this is a highly unlikely event, it is still incumbent on us to take proactive steps to ensure student safety, and securing the access to campus is one of the recommended best practices."

Moving forward, all classroom doors on all campuses will be locked at all times so entry from the outside will not be automatic. Staff members or students needing to access classrooms after classes begin will need to identify themselves to the classroom teacher before entry is permitted. If a school is on lockdown due to a potential threat either on campus or in the area of a campus, no one will be given access to a locked classroom during that lockdown.

School administrators will be working with staff, students, parents and community members to communicate this change and how it will be handled at their schools.

All visitors -- including parents -- to a school site will need to check in at the front office, sign in and be issued a badge. The visitor will be announced to the classroom teacher and/or escorted by a staff member to the classroom.

"We understand that closing our campuses prior to the start of the school day may be considered inconvenient or even excessive by some of our families," said Lyon. "At the same time, we have heard from many parents and staff members who support the increased safety measures and appreciate the need to do whatever we possibly can to ensure our campuses are as safe as possible."

Elementary and middle school site staff members have been trained in the HERO (Hide, Escape, Run, Overcome) program that addresses how to respond to an intruder on campus. Many of our staff members already shared this important information with their students, and all will provide this training to their students at the beginning of the this school year. High school staff members and students will receive training this school year as well.

The District staff will monitor and evaluate the closed campuses this year and will update the Board of Education as the year progresses.

New Solar Project at Desert Springs: The District recently celebrated the commemoration of the completed covered parking lot and ball field solar structures at Desert Springs Middle School, with a ribbon cutting and dedication ceremony. The project was funded by a \$1.6 million grant from South Coast Air Quality Management District AB 1318 Mitigation Fees Fund, aimed at reducing or mitigating emissions in Valley produced by PVC Sentinel Peaker Plant. The project will save District about \$1.8 million energy costs over the next 20 years. The District owns solar arrays at three other schools and has 11 solar parking canopies at various sites acquired through a power purchase agreement projected to save \$10 to \$12 million in energy costs over next 20 years.


